A Conversation with Valerie Doyon

Why did you get involved with CSPA?

I've been a writer for the CSPA for over three years. Back when I was a medical student, my mentor, Dr. Harry Liu, gave me the opportunity to write a 24-page handbook called You and Your Derm. It was a great experience that complemented my academic and medical writing skills. Although I love "nerding out" on the intricacies of complex dermatologic conditions, it's just as important for me to connect with my patients in a practical, relatable way-- breaking down complicated concepts into something easy to understand. Writing for the CSPA allows me to do just that.

What do you perceive as outcomes of your involvement?

Through the CSPA, I get to write about real-life questions patients have-- like how to mentally prepare a child for a skin biopsy, reapply sunscreen over makeup, or make the most of a doctor's appointment. These are the kinds of practical concerns that often get overlooked in traditional medical literature. Not everything patients need to know is in a medical journal—the CSPA gives me a voice to talk about the things that matter to patients but don't always make it into textbooks. Helping patients one-on-one in clinic is incredibly fulfilling-- but through writing educational content for SKIN magazine, I can reach thousands of readers across Canada and make an even broader impact. It's deeply rewarding. Lastly, having a skin condition can be isolating, especially when it's visible and carries stigma. The CSPA creates a trusted space where patients can learn, connect, and feel seen. Because the content is developed alongside dermatologists and grounded in evidence, I often recommend the CSPA website as a go-to resource for my patients.

Why do you like volunteering with CSPA?

To write well, I need to put myself in my patients' shoes. It deepens my empathy and helps me better understand the challenges patients face-- not only in managing their skin, but in navigating the healthcare system as a whole. Researching topics also deepens my knowledge, which ultimately helps me become a better clinician and future dermatologist.

Why would you tell others that they should get involved with CSPA?

As dermatology residents, we do a lot of scientific and academic writing—but we don't always get to practice writing in plain language. Volunteering with the CSPA is a fun and meaningful way to do that. You really need to understand a topic well to explain it clearly and simply, and that skill is invaluable.

Has a personal connection with the skin patient community inspired your participation?

Absolutely! I wouldn't be in dermatology if I hadn't experienced a host of my own skin, hair, and nail issues. From urticaria to infestations, my lived experience is what sparked my passion for dermatology and for writing about it in a way that supports others.
